Notes from the full Parish Council meeting

The current Electric Vehicle charging point supplier of the unit at the car park outside the Memorial Hall and Market Kitchen cafe is selling their business and in discussion with a new company to take over. The outcome will be made by 28th February.

It was agreed that the Parish Council would meet informally initially to discuss the feedback from the Community event, and the suggestions made. The Parish Council will discuss the most popular options with the community at the Annual Parish Meeting.

A driver had crashed into the millennium stone on the A38 in December 2024 and now have the details of the driver and their insurance company to contact for the work to mend the stone.

The Parish Council agreed to write to the Minister for Transport and Tessa Munt asking what would be achieved by adding the new roundabout at Churchill lights and to send us the cost benefit analysis. Current target data from North Somerset Council will be included to emphasize the insignificance of the scheme.

There are various overgrown hedges in Front St that require cutting back as it has been noted children are forced into the road because of this. The clerk will write to the owners to cut back their hedges.

Councillor M Baker reported a local footpath was blocked and the clerk will share with the PROW officer.

North Somerset Council are holding events to discuss the Local Plan, and the Parish Council will respond at the next meeting.

Councillor Bush advised that the road surface on Ladymead Lane/Jubilee Lane is deteriorating rapidly due to flooding and is causing damage to vehicles using the lane. The clerk will report this again to North Somerset Council.



Mendip Hills Fund Awards £9,000 to Local Projects

The Mendip Hills Fund was able to make grants to nine projects this year, with a total of £9,125 awarded to projects that help the environment and community across the Mendip Hills.

Grants were awarded for restoring heritage fingerposts in Butcombe, helping vulnerable people volunteer and create new areas for wildlife, protecting a heritage trail exhibit in Axbridge, assisting people from diverse backgrounds enjoy the Mendip Hills, improving school grounds for wildlife and a contribution to energy efficient heating in the Cheddar Visitor Information Centre.

Jim Hardcastle, Manager of the Mendip Hills National Landscape, said: 'The panel of local people who make the decisions are thrilled to see the number of children and local people who will benefit from the grants. Visitors and local businesses are delighted to contribute to the Fund when they see how helpful a local grant scheme like this can be. It's been a difficult year raising money for the Mendip Hills Fund which is why we've only been able to distribute $\mathfrak{L}9,125$ this year despite having applications worth over $\mathfrak{L}25,000$.

Kirsty Campbell, Programmes Manager at Somerset Community Foundation, said: "It's fantastic that the Mendip Hills Fund is able to support such great projects and organisations, helping both communities and the environment - which so often benefit each other."

Funds are raised thanks to gifts from businesses, events and visitors who wish to give something back to this very special area, helping to conserve and enhance the special qualities of the Mendip Hills, and benefit local communities.

Explore gardening topics with John Simmons

March is officially the first month of spring, and gardens will soon go into overdrive. There is much to be done....

Gardening magazines will tell you that this is the month to start mowing. With winters as they are you may well have never stopped. Don't mow if it's wet or frosty, and keep the blades on a high setting.

Tidy up any remaining dead bits in the flower borders and deadhead bulbs, but don't tie your daff leaves into little knots – you might think they look cute but they really don't like it!

Buddleias can be pruned hard, cutting them back close to the ground. They'll re-grow very quickly. Colourful dogwoods can also be cut back. Trim last year's stems to short stubs; it is this year's growth that will be colourful next winter, not the older woody stems. The pruned stems can be used as plant supports, but you should remove the bark from the bottom few inches or they'll root themselves.

It is a sad fact of life that weeds get going quicker than the plants you want, so get your nicely sharpened hoe on them. Be careful not to slice through emerging growth of perennials.

Summer flowering perennials like hostas, phlox and daylilies can be divided and spread around your garden.

If you like big-blowsy tuberous begonias in your pots and hanging baskets then get them going now. Gently push the tubers into damp compost with the hollow side up, then leave them somewhere bright and warm. In similar fashion dahlias can also be started off now. Put them in a pot of damp peat-free compost somewhere free of frost.

In preparation for the coming months, when you'll soon need to feed plants, I thought I'd include an educational bit about fertilisers; you need to use the right stuff at the right time.

Fertilisers contain the three major plant nutrients, NPK:

- Nitrogen (N) boosts leafy growth and is most needed in spring and early summer. Used late in the season it will promote soft growth that is easily damaged by frost. High nitrogen feeders include lawn food.
- Phosphorus (P) promotes root development, so higher levels of phosphorus are required when planting, particularly in autumn. Bonemeal is a great source of phosphorus.
- Potassium (K) helps flowers and fruit to form and should be applied from late spring to the end of summer. Tomato feed is high in potassium, and promotes flower and fruit production in fruiting plants.

Product labels carry a detailed breakdown of the three major nutrients, always in the order NPK, and shown as a percentage.



If the numbers are the same or similar, this is a 'balanced' fertiliser. Where one number is higher than others (as pictured above), this means the proportion differs and the fertiliser is best used at a particular time of year. In this instance the fertiliser is high in potassium; it's primarily aimed at fruiting plants.

As well as what's in it also consider the formulation of the fertiliser. Liquid feeds act immediately whereas pelleted fertilisers take longer to release their nutrients. Granular or powdered fertiliser is quick and simple to apply and usually needs only one or two applications in a growing season. Liquid or concentrated fertilisers need diluting and watering on, and tend to need more frequent application.

Are you organic? Fertilisers can be artificially produced (inorganic or synthetic) or based on plant or animal products. The latter are considered 'organic' but if you want to garden as a vegetarian or vegan, bonemeal and blood, fish and bone are organic fertilisers might not be to your liking. Inorganic fertilisers tend to feed the plant in one application but offer no long-term benefits to the soil. Organic fertilisers not only feed the plant but the soil too, contributing to its long-term health. Fertiliser lesson over.

Remember that gardening is not all about hard work. Get out and about and visit some local gardens. Large gardens like Tyntesfield, Hestercombe and Yeo Valley look lovely on a sunny spring day. Alternatively, come on one of our minibus trips....

Young musicians had a chance to show off their skills and talents on Monday, in the 17th Edition of the Churchill Music Young Musician of the Year competition, hosted by Churchill Music in association with Churchill Academy and Sixth Form. The lucky audience heard a wide range of styles and instruments, from baroque violin music to Radiohead on piano, via songs by Schubert and Minchin. There was quite a brass band flavour too, with contrasting solos on trombone, tenor horn and euphonium. The standard of performance was high, and the audience's enjoyment of the music was spiced by the element of competition - which was the 'best' performance?

The distinguished panel of judges - Richard Crabtree, Julian Forbes and Holly Greenwood-Rogers - gave interesting feedback, with a couple of impromptu and fascinating masterclasses.

The Trophy winner this year was Wilfred Maitland-Round, whose euphonium pieces included a spectacular Concert Etude by Goedicke, and a mellow rendition of 'Stardust'. Toby Wilson, in his fifth and last appearance in the competition, won the audience prize. His performance on the violin of 'Romance' by Amy Beach was deeply expressive and personal. The Junior Trophy was won by Molly Blundell (Year 9). Her lively and bold playing of Telemann - unaccompanied - was especially memorable. We look forward to seeing all of these young musicians going from strength to strength.

The winners also have the opportunity to enter the District Final of the Rotary Young Musician of the Year competition on Sunday 2nd March held this year at Churchill Academy.
