### **Churchill and Langford Parish Council – Meeting Summary**

The Parish Council welcomed Councillor Jeremy Comley who was co-opted at the February meeting. He has lived in Churchill for over 20 years and is interested in reducing speeding traffic on the A38.

Jeremy has an allotment in the parish.



He will submit a proposal to North Somerset Council to request permission for Speed Indicator Devices to be installed on the A38 and once agreed, will begin approaching local businesses for donations to fund the scheme.

It was agreed that the notice board at the traffic lights would be moved to the recreation area for more residents to see. It will have a different look, watch this space.

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on 20th April 2026 at Churchill Memorial Hall at 7pm. The theme this year is celebrating volunteers. We would love to see residents join us for a glass of wine and local groups to come along and help anyone interested in volunteering.

Councillor Simpson will be acting Treasurer at the Memorial Hall.

Councillor Alleyne produced a detailed briefing on road safety, focusing on Pudding Pie Lane. This will be shared with North Somerset Council and Councillor Keating. It details areas that require action to improve road safety for children going to and from the Primary School.



## **Report a Pothole**

With all the rain you might have noticed an increasing number of potholes on our local roads. These are at best a nuisance for drivers but increasingly can present a safety risk due to tyre damage which, may not be spotted immediately.

Residents can help by reporting potholes directly to North Somerset Council using this online reporting form. <https://forms.n-somerset.gov.uk/report-request/form/potholes#/1> It only takes a few minutes to complete, and each report helps build a clearer picture of where repairs are most urgently needed. The more potholes that are reported in this way, the more likely they are to be inspected and repaired promptly.

## A Night of Outstanding Young Talent at Churchill Music

Churchill Music's **Young Musician of the Year Competition** once again proved to be a resounding success. The standard of performance from the students at Churchill Academy was outstanding, and the atmosphere in the church was warm, encouraging and celebratory.

The adjudication panel was also outstanding this year. Chair, Julian Forbes, MA (Cantab) MA (R.A.M.), was joined by Holly Greenwood-Rogers, BA (Durham) MMus (RBC) and Helena Torpy, BMus. The awards were presented by Chair of Churchill Music Trustees, Trevor Smallwood OBE. One of the distinctive features of the competition is that each student is required to introduce their own performance. In preparation, the Chair of the panel visited Churchill Academy prior to the competition to offer guidance to the competitors on presentation. The results were clear: confident, articulate and engaging introductions that enhanced the musical experience for everyone.

**Churchill Music Young Musician of the Year 2026** is Year 10 pianist, **Luna Bavetta**. Luna's performance of Debussy's First Arabesque and Chopin's Waltz in E minor was described as impressively managed and technically masterful. Her musical maturity and control marked her out as a worthy winner.

The **Ursula Dornton Vocal Prize**, generously sponsored by the **Trinity Singers**, was won by Year 12 student, **Izzy Russe**. Izzy's performances of Frederick Loewe's 'I Could Have Danced All Night' and Andrew Lloyd Webber's 'Think of Me' delighted us all. She clearly immersed herself in the music and communicated her enjoyment with warmth and conviction.

The audience voted for tenor-horn player, Jamie Samuel to receive the **Churchill Music Audience Trophy**. Jamie performed Albinoni's Adagio (arr. Bissill) and Rube Bloom's 'Give me the simple life'. Jamie was praised by the panel for his "fundamentally gorgeous, well-supplied, tonally secure sound", a comment warmly echoed by the appreciative applause from the congregation.

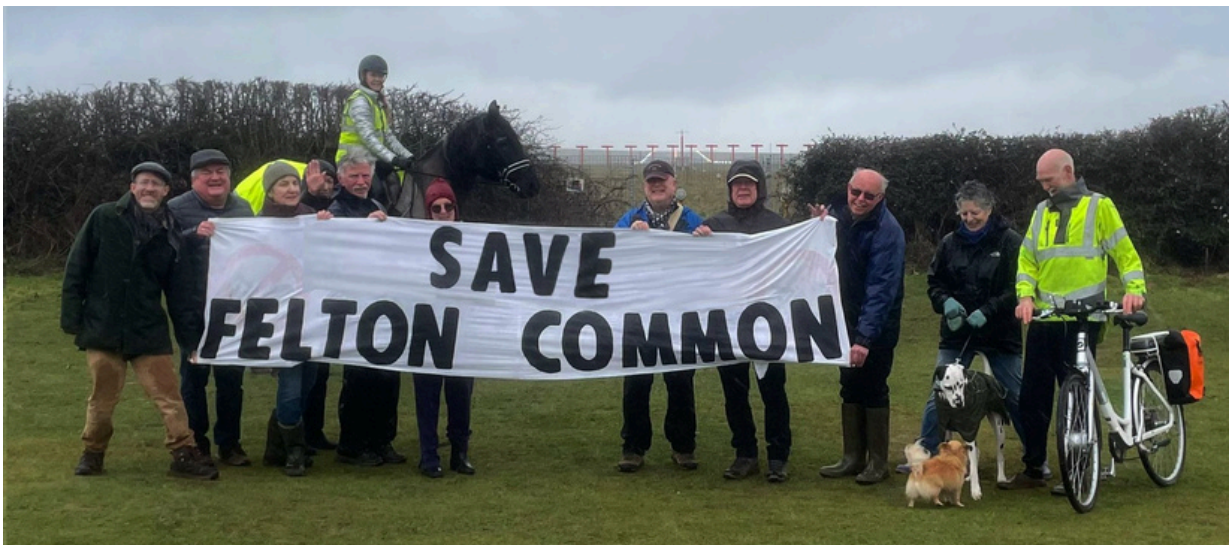
All winners are invited to enter the **Rotary Young Musician District Final**, at Taunton School on **Sunday 8th March**, presenting a wonderful opportunity to showcase their talents on a wider stage.

Introducing the evening, trustee **Jan Murray** offered a 'Thought for the evening' on the recognition of the fundamental benefits of music education for all, for over 2,500 years, citing Plato, (420BCE) saying, "I would teach children music, physics and philosophy; but most importantly music, for the patterns in music and all the arts are the keys to learning," to 21st century's Jef Raskin, inventor of the Mac computer saying, "If I had not studied music, there would be no Macintosh computers today". The message was clear, music shapes minds, communities and futures.

Head Teacher **Chris Hildrew** summed up the evening perfectly:

"We are delighted to partner with Churchill Music yet again for a fantastic evening celebrating the excellent musicianship of our students. Music is a vital part of the life of our Academy and remains the beating heart of our school community."

Churchill Music continues to play a vital role in nurturing young musicians through this competition, violin taster sessions in local primary schools, workshops with visiting national and international musicians, and its inspiring **'Power of Music'** project, teaching children in years 5 and 6 in local primary schools how, if film-makers and advertisers use music to alter our perceptions, we can all do so too. It explains the reasoning, what happens in the brain and how they can help each other through music. Churchill Music's Young Musician of the Year competition was, in every sense, an evening that demonstrated the power of music to uplift, inspire and bring a community together.



## Save Felton Common

A lot has happened since Bristol Airport's surprise announcement on November 3<sup>rd</sup> that they wished to relocate the runway threshold to accommodate larger aircraft to serve long-haul destinations as part of their plans to eventually reach 15 million passengers a year. This will involve erecting 21 runway approach lights on a minimum of 8 columns in 8 rows, 30 M apart, intruding 240M into the common. Columns would range in height from 1.25M closest to the A38, increasing to 8.5M furthest from the A38 due to the downward slope of the common at this point. Each column will be protected by a 3M high fence with the total fenced area measuring a minimum of 927 M<sup>2</sup> with vehicle access required for occasional maintenance and safety checks. Moving the threshold towards Winford also means aircraft landing from this direction would be 12.5 M lower in the sky than they are at the moment. This was a part of the "Runway Approach Lighting Consultation" letter and document that was sent to nearby residents and those with grazing rights. Together with an online version which gave 6 weeks until December 19<sup>th</sup> to respond. BA also ran a drop-in event at Felton Village Hall on November the 20<sup>th</sup> from 3-8 PM, which was very well attended, with entrance having to be periodically restricted in the afternoon as there were too many people in the hall.

BAAN (Bristol Airport Action Network) held a meeting at Felton Village Hall on the evening of 2<sup>nd</sup> December to encourage opposition to the proposal and get as many as possible to reply to the consultation. The hall was packed with over 120 attendees, and 18 people put their names forward to establish a group to protect the common which has become SFC.

Winford Parish Council published their official opposition to the proposals on their website on December the 16<sup>th</sup>.

I attended the Airport Consultative Committee meeting at the airport on Jan 15<sup>th</sup> as I had submitted written questions and was asked to attend. Under questioning from myself, Andrew Goodchild, BA Head of Planning and Growth, admitted there were some flaws in the consultation, and they had underestimated the demand for the drop in event. Under later questioning from one of the Parish Councillors, he admitted BA had received 640 responses which were almost universally negative and they had underestimated the strength of local opposition. We are unlikely to learn more about the responses as this was a private BA consultation.

Since then, SFC has had 3 meetings, chosen a committee and now has a constitution, e-mail address and Facebook page and is planning a wide range of opposition.

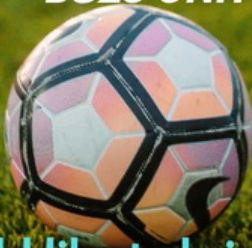

**We are urging residents and businesses to be vigilant following reports counterfeit £20 notes are in circulation in Taunton.**

**Officers have received reports the counterfeit notes have been used in separate transactions at two outlets and are now issuing advice on how to spot them.**

**Please check £20 notes carefully, paying particular attention to:**

- **The hologram image – This should change between “Twenty” and “Pounds” when tilted.**
- **The transparent window – This will have clearly defined images and edges.**
- **Raised print – Especially check the words ‘Bank of England’.**
- **If a note feels unusual, appears blurry, or lacks security features, do not accept it.**



Explore gardening topics with John Simmons

March is here. It's officially spring, but also a month when winter is just as likely to rear its ugly head. Be careful about putting anything tender outside just yet, as you are likely to lose it. Having said that, there is still much to be getting on with....

### Fruit and veg

- I've never had much luck with carrots but if you want to give them a try they can be sown now. To avoid the ravages of carrot root fly sow the seeds inside cloches or under fleece.
- Sow tomato seeds in pots indoors.
- Plant onion and shallot sets, spacing them 10-15cm apart
- Sow spinach, covering with cloches or fleece.
- Plant early potatoes in trenches or in large tubs or bags if space is limited. Old multipurpose compost bags, or the large green bags that we used to use for garden waste are worth a try.
- Sow parsnips as soon as the soil starts to warm up. They are slow to germinate and need a long growing season.
- Start hoeing veg beds as soon as the weather starts to warm up, as weeds will germinate quickly
- Plant strawberries in a hanging basket to keep the fruits away from slugs
- Give blackcurrant bushes a high-nitrogen feed

### The flower garden

- Deadhead daffodils and other spring bulbs but let the greenery die-back naturally.
- Prune dogwoods, willows and cotinus right down to the base to promote vigorous new growth.
- Forced bulbs like hyacinths and tulips can be planted into the garden, for blooms next spring.
- Plant lilies and other summer-flowering bulbs in pots and borders.
- Feed ericaceous (acid-soil loving) shrubs, such as rhododendrons, azaleas, camellias and pieris, with an ericaceous fertiliser.
- Mulch borders generously with garden compost.
- Check tender new shoots for aphids, and remove before infestations get out of hand
- Continue deadheading spring flowers and any remaining winter bedding so they don't set seed

### A few cheap ways to multiply your stock and bring colour to your garden

- If you like big-bloomy tuberous begonias in your pots and hanging baskets then get them going now. Gently push the tubers into damp compost with the hollow side up, then leave them somewhere bright and warm.
- Sow a selection of vibrant annual climbers, such as Spanish flag (*Ipomoea lobata*) and black-eyed Susan (*Thunbergia alata* 'Arizona Glow'). They can be planted out in a month or two.
- Buy young bedding plants for growing on to a larger size under glass, or sow your own in a heated propagator.
- Sow dwarf French beans in a large pot for an early indoor crop in June.
- Take cuttings from dahlia tubers planted last month to raise new plants.
- Take basal cuttings from perennials, such as delphiniums and lupins, to root in a pot indoors
