



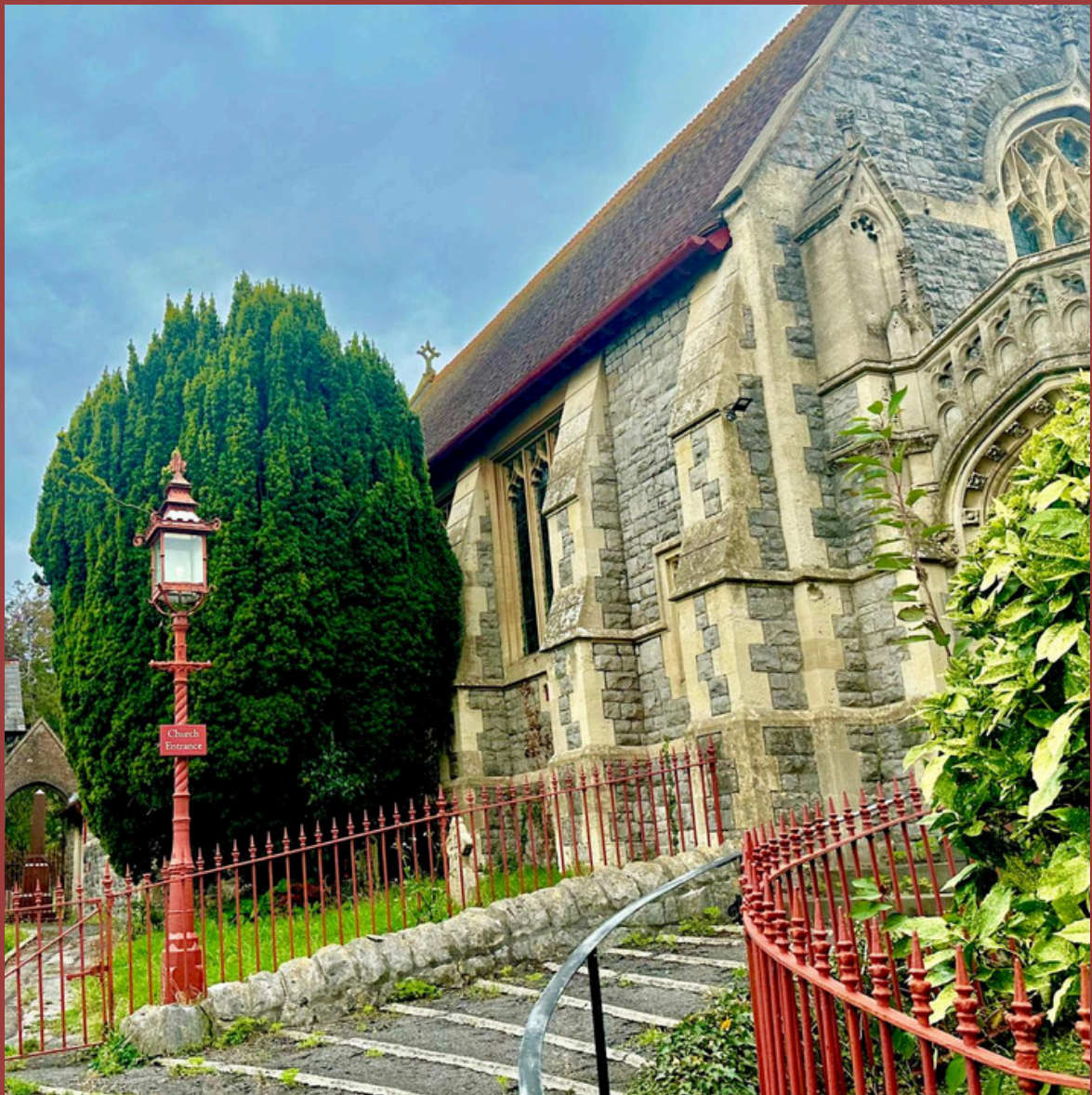

## Churchill and Langford Parish Council – Meeting Summary

The Parish Council have approved the Market Kitchen's proposed patio plans. The Market Kitchen will improve the seating area on the existing space at the front of the cafe.

A new bin will be added to the Community shelter.

No decisions have been made. This is an evidence-gathering exercise to help the council understand local need.

# **Churchill and Langford Annual Get-Together. Community, Commitment and What's Next**

The Churchill and Langford annual get-together brought people together for a simple but powerful reason. Community. The evening focused on the role volunteers play across the parish, and the difference even the smallest contribution can make.

## **A community built on people**

Chair of the Parish Council, Jackie Bush, opened the evening with a clear message. You do not need a lot of time to make a difference. Even an hour a month matters.

Volunteering is not just about helping others. It helps you. It builds friendships. It connects you to where you live. It gives a sense of belonging.

There was also an honest reflection. At times, the community has lost its way. But things are changing. There is a sense that the village is coming back together. That makes this the right moment to get involved.

## **What the Parish Council has delivered**

The past year has seen real, visible progress across the parish:

- New toilet facilities added to the cricket pavilion. Funded through Section 106 contributions and designed to blend seamlessly with the existing building
- Ongoing drainage improvements across the playing fields. Football pitches are already benefiting, with further work completed near the play park
- A new community defibrillator installed behind the clock tower at the Reading Room. This improves access at that end of the village
- A new community shelter replacing the old dugout. This creates a flexible space for events, families and local groups
- Early work underway to maintain and improve the skate park. Young people are being asked what they want to see next
- A third speed indicator device now in place to raise awareness of speeding in the village

This work reflects a council focused on practical outcomes. It also shows a clear effort to secure external funding where possible, rather than placing pressure on local finances.

## **The people behind the work**

Clerk Sally Diaz highlighted something often overlooked. Every parish councillor is a volunteer.

They give their time alongside jobs, families and other commitments. They sit on multiple groups. They handle both praise and criticism. They do it because they care about the village and want it to thrive.

There is also a strong team behind the scenes:

- The parish orderly keeps the village clean, safe and looking its best
- Communications ensure residents stay informed and connected
- Councillors bring a mix of creativity, practical thinking and local knowledge

## **Two new councillors have strengthened the team this year:**

Gary, already making an impact through grant funding applications and a focus on traffic issues

Jeremy, bringing experience and a strong focus on safety, particularly along the A38

As the Council members increase it allows the council to do more as the workload is shared.

## **Funding and finances**

The council has worked carefully to balance ambition with affordability.

- Over £50,000 received in Section 106 funding
- Around £65,500 from Community Infrastructure Levy funds
- £1,000 distributed in village grants

The parish precept has increased slightly, from £130,466 to £139,958. For a Band D household, this equates to an increase of 46p per month.

This was not a decision taken lightly. The aim has been to keep increases as low as possible while maintaining services and investing in the parish.

## **Looking ahead**

There is more to come.

Plans are developing for further improvements across the parish, alongside a full programme of events, including the annual Village Day.

The Parish Council has linked up with Banwell and Winscombe and Sandford Parish Council and the Impact Alliance. This is a scheme aimed to combat loneliness in the community.

The focus remains clear. Use funding wisely. Improve what already exists. Strengthen the sense of community.

## **Recognition and appreciation**

The evening also celebrated those who go above and beyond.

Community Champion Awards were presented to:

James Kennedy for his care and support of community members through The Market Kitchen

Emma Stocks for her work supporting the Reading Room

Their contributions reflect the spirit of the parish. Quiet, consistent and deeply valued.

Work to future-proof the A38/A368 crossroads between Churchill and Langford is set to begin on Monday 11 May.

The Churchill traffic improvement scheme aims to alleviate congestion, improve traffic flow, and enhance both current and future bus services. Under the approved design, the existing crossroads will be transformed into a roundabout with smart traffic signals.

The infrastructure improvements to the crossroads include:

- Converting the crossroads where the A38 and A368 meet between Langford and Churchill into a modern roundabout, complete with smart traffic signals. This upgrade will improve traffic flow, allowing the junction to handle a higher volume of vehicles than is currently possible.
- Implementing smart signals at all four approaches to the roundabout, with prioritisation for buses and the A38, ensuring smoother traffic movement and supporting public transport efficiency.
- Installing four controlled crossings on each arm of the roundabout to provide safer access for pedestrians and cyclists, enhancing overall safety and mobility.
- Building new pavements around the junction to improve pedestrian safety and ensure safer movement for all users.
- Planting five semi-mature trees as part of the landscaping scheme. While some trees will be removed due to construction, most are nearing the end of their life. New, more resilient trees will be planted in collaboration with the council's tree officer.
- Introducing a bus-only lane on the west side of the roundabout, enabling buses traveling along A368 Dinghurst Road to easily access the bus stop. This lane will also be available for use by community minibuses, improving public transport access

The current junction is already at capacity, often congested during peak times, and is expected to face even greater traffic volumes with the expected increase of housing, population and road users. To address these challenges, the new signalised roundabout will be implemented, designed to improve traffic flow, reduce congestion, and provide a safer, more efficient route for all users.

Included in the work plan, the council will carry out highway maintenance in the area. This includes road resurfacing, drainage upgrades, improved traffic signals at crossings, and enhanced street lighting to benefit all users. By incorporating these essential upgrades into the scheme, local maintenance budgets are freed up to be spent on other priority areas across North Somerset.

The works have been carefully planned to minimise disruption. The A38 is a key part of the North Somerset region, so the project is being managed to reduce impact on the network as much as possible. While this may extend the overall timeline, ensuring minimal disruption remains the top priority.

Current programme of works

- 11-17 May – Traffic management
- 11-22 May – Off-peak lane closure
- 5 June – 27 August – 24-hour lane closure: Bus Gate & Northwest Quadrant
- 28 August – 22 October – Southwest Quadrant works
- 23-28 October – Off-peak 2-way signals and lane closure
- 5 June – 29 October – 24-hour lane closure: A38 Southbound
- 25 August – 30 October – Main Gyratory East works
- 2 November – 20 November – Narrow lanes with off-peak lane closures: Roundabout
- 23 November – 28 January – 24-hour lane closure with narrow lanes: Southeast Quadrant
- 29 January – 16 February – Off-peak lane closures with narrow lanes: Splitter Islands
- 17 February – 5 March – Off-peak lane closures with narrow lanes: Splitter Islands



These dates are subject to change with an earlier completion date anticipated than currently planned.

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## Update from Tessa Munt, MP for Churchill and Langford

Another busy month! I attended the annual Legal Service, which marked the appointment of the new High Sheriff of Somerset, Peter Dixon. Somerset's beautiful ceremonial sword and scabbard are kept safely by High Sheriffs during their term of office.

I ran 29 surgeries last month – 13 at my regular monthly venues and 'extras' in 16 rural cafés, community hubs, a garden centre café, a beer shed and two village pub nights. Thank you if you came to speak to me. I value listening to your views and concerns, which inform my work as your MP in Westminster.

Locally, I was proud to join Amnesty International's local representatives to mark International Women's Day. They campaign relentlessly for access to legal and welfare support for the many female prisoners held in terrible conditions across the globe.

It was a pleasure to welcome Tim Farron, MP and Lib Dem Spokesperson for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs to my 'patch'. We spent a day visiting inspiring people and projects, and Tim spoke to an audience, answering questions from farmers and others. If you'd like to know about future events, please contact me.

In Westminster, I met the 'real' Ash Smith and Peter Hammond of *'Dirty Business'* fame, discussing the newly-released sewage spill data for 2025 and what can and should be done to clean up our rivers, streams and rhynes. I also attended a joint NFU/WWF/RSPCA meeting advocating fair trade - high standards for food imports, and I've met the Energy Minister to highlight the problems for rural households dependent on increasingly expensive oil for their heating and hot water.

In Parliament I have spoken on a number of matters, raising the following:

- \* the importance of returning to 0.7% spending on overseas aid as both humanitarian and national security measures
- \* securing guarantees that foreign national prisoners complete their UK Court ordered prison terms when they're transferred to their 'home' country
- \* rigorous monitoring by the Home Office of the contract for tagging offenders released early or on licence
- \* whether drug company incentives should be investigated as these may influence which drugs are prescribed
- \* reforming the regulation of Funeral Directors
- \* holding Government to account for top level briefings given to Peter Mandelson before his vetting was completed
- \* pressing the Government on the need for pumps to be ready prior to flooding, not after it happens
- \* outlining the need for strong measures and clear accountability for safeguarding in small religious organisations and cults
- \* ensuring planning regulations protect the accessibility of hospital helipads for air ambulance use

Explore gardening topics with John Simmons

May is typically the month when I plant-up the pots on my patio that are going to provide some close to the house colour through the summer and autumn. Over the years I have learned that combining plants together in pots involves both art and science; art to get the heights and colour combinations right, and science to select plants that are going to be happy in the challenging conditions that pots can present. I have got both the artistic and scientific elements wrong on many occasions over the years, so these days, when I'm filling a pot (either hanging or standing) that is large enough to include several plants, I try to adopt the 'Thriller, Filler, and Spiller' approach.

**Thriller:** The centrepiece or focal point of the container, the thriller plant is usually tall and dramatic; designed to draw the eye. Thrillers may have bold flowers, striking foliage, or unique shapes. They are typically placed in the centre or back of the container. Examples include *Dracaena*, purple fountain grass, cane begonias, dwarf sunflowers or *heliopsis*, mandevilla (on a climbing support), dahlias, or *Canna lilies*.

**Filler:** Medium-height plants that surround the thriller, adding fullness, texture, and colour contrast. These plants complement the thriller without overpowering it. They often form mounded or bushy shapes. Popular fillers include petunias, alyssum, impatiens (busy lizzie), pelargoniums (or geraniums), heuchera, sedums, or coleus.

**Spiller:** These are trailing or cascading plants that soften the edges of the container and create movement. Examples include ipomea (a much prettier and less invasive relative of our native bindweed), trailing petunias and begonias, *Dichondra argentea* 'Silver Falls', variegated ivy.

You'll have noticed that many of the plants I have suggested are not necessarily the standard ones that you expect to find in pots. Why? Because I get bored with those and like to experiment a bit. Sometimes it works, and sometimes it doesn't – that's gardening!

Once planted apply a mulch on top to reduce water loss. You'll have to water and feed regularly through the summer, which is why I've rigged up an irrigation system and timer; it saves hours across the year.

What else to do?

Hopefully all chance of frost has now passed so you can plant out summer bedding plants. Don't move them straight outside though, they need to be 'hardened off' over a week or so, bringing them back inside, or closing the cold-frame, at night, particularly if temperatures are due to drop into the single figures.

If you have potted up dahlias somewhere warm, then they should have good strong shoots and can go outside now.

French and runner beans can be sown outside from mid-May. If they are climbing varieties you should have the climbing frame in place before you sow seeds or plant out the young plants. Mangetout and sugar snaps can also be sown now. Courgettes, squashes and tomatoes can go outside towards the end of the month. Quick-growing crops like beetroot, radish and salad leaves can be sown every few weeks to get a succession of crops. Thinking ahead to next winter, purple sprouting broccoli sown now will be ready for cropping around about next February/ March. Cover it with fine mesh or you will be squashing caterpillars all summer.
