Churchill and Langford Parish Council – Meeting Summary

Councillor J Bush was re-elected Chairman and Councillor D Johnson as Vice Chairman at the Annual Parish Council meeting in May.

Councillor Keating reported that he was liaising with the Transport Policy Team regarding speeding concerns on Blackmoor. North Somerset Council will liaise with Dolebury Warren residents and flood work will begin during the summer 2026.

The speed data sent by Councillor Ronicle has been useful to reflect issues in the parish. The clerk will email Councillor Keating regarding the work on the roundabout at Churchill lights. The space on the roundabout needs to be maintenance free as access will be impossible. Hard copies of the BSIP scheme have not been received.

Councillor Ronicle reported on congestion issues on Stock Lane where it's too narrow for two large commercial vehicles to pass. He asked that this issue is addressed once the Banwell Bypass is in operation.

Councillor Johnson raised the issues on exiting Ladymead Lane when the new roundabout is in operation. The white box- on A38 has faded and the Council would like to see it replaced with hatched yellow lines for vehicles to exit from the junction. Councillor Keating was asked to raise this with the BSIP team. Councillor Keating reported that residents had raised concerns regarding speeding on Ladymead Lane. Suggestions from residents include speed bumps, however chicanes would be more effective. The developers of the new housing proposal on Ladymead Lane have listed traffic calming measures if the scheme is approved.

The Parish Council will respond to the Planning Application to expand Bristol Airport at the June meeting. Thank You for Taking Part in the Skate Park Consultation

Churchill Parish Council would like to thank everyone who took part in the recent skate park consultation, which ran from 11 April to 14 May 2026.

The consultation was carried out to help the Council better understand current use of the existing skate park. The survey was aimed particularly at young people, families and potential skate park users, alongside the wider parish community.

The responses have now been reviewed and compiled into a report for councillors. The findings will help inform future discussions around the skate park and any potential next steps.

At this stage, no decisions have been made.

Bob's Seventh Ukraine Journey

Our fellow Rotarian, Bob Preedy, has just completed his most recent 1400-mile trip to Lviv, where the minibus and much-appreciated goods were delivered. He was bravely supported by co-drivers Rtn Richard Bigwood and his son Peter. The Peugeot Minibus was most kindly donated by Churchill and Langford Minibus Society, Chairman Trevor Smallwood. The bus was packed to the roof with essential kit – medical equipment, wheelchairs, walkers, generators and much more. See photo.

On arrival, the bus and its contents were handed over to the Hospitallers Charity, made up of volunteer paramedics and Doctors providing medical treatment to soldiers on the front line.

A poignant story: The next stage of this journey was to take the equipment to Odessa and other front-line Cities. On their journey, they came across an elderly Lady struggling to cross the road using a chair as a crutch. They stopped and presented her with a Rollator from the van. – see photo. This has been donated by someone reading this from around N Somerset!

Work to future-proof the A38/A368 crossroads between Churchill and Langford

The Churchill traffic improvement scheme aims to alleviate congestion, improve traffic flow, and enhance both current and future bus services. Under the approved design, the existing crossroads will be transformed into a roundabout with smart traffic signals.

The infrastructure improvements to the crossroads include:

- Converting the crossroads where the A38 and A368 meet between Langford and Churchill into a modern roundabout, complete with smart traffic signals. This upgrade will improve traffic flow, allowing the junction to handle a higher volume of vehicles than is currently possible.
- Implementing smart signals at all four approaches to the roundabout, with prioritisation for buses and the A38, ensuring smoother traffic movement and supporting public transport efficiency.
- Installing four controlled crossings on each arm of the roundabout to provide safer access for pedestrians and cyclists, enhancing overall safety and mobility.
- Building new pavements around the junction to improve pedestrian safety and ensure safer movement for all users.
- Planting five semi-mature trees as part of the landscaping scheme. While some trees will be removed due to construction, most are nearing the end of their life. New, more resilient trees will be planted in collaboration with the council's tree officer.
- Introducing a bus-only lane on the west side of the roundabout, enabling buses traveling along A368 Dinghurst Road to easily access the bus stop. This lane will also be available for use by community minibuses, improving public transport access

The current junction is already at capacity, often congested during peak times, and is expected to face even greater traffic volumes with the expected increase of housing, population and road users. To address these challenges, the new signalised roundabout will be implemented, designed to improve traffic flow, reduce congestion, and provide a safer, more efficient route for all users.

Included in the work plan, the council will carry out highway maintenance in the area. This includes road resurfacing, drainage upgrades, improved traffic signals at crossings, and enhanced street lighting to benefit all users. By incorporating these essential upgrades into the scheme, local maintenance budgets are freed up to be spent on other priority areas across North Somerset.

The works have been carefully planned to minimise disruption. The A38 is a key part of the North Somerset region, so the project is being managed to reduce impact on the network as much as possible. While this may extend the overall timeline, ensuring minimal disruption remains the top priority.

Current programme of works

- 5 June – 27 August – 24-hour lane closure: Bus Gate & Northwest Quadrant
- 28 August – 22 October – Southwest Quadrant works
- 23-28 October – Off-peak 2-way signals and lane closure
- 5 June – 29 October – 24-hour lane closure: A38 Southbound
- 25 August – 30 October – Main Gyratory East works
- 2 November – 20 November – Narrow lanes with off-peak lane closures: Roundabout
- 23 November – 28 January – 24-hour lane closure with narrow lanes: Southeast Quadrant
- 29 January – 16 February – Off-peak lane closures with narrow lanes: Splitter Islands
- 17 February – 5 March – Off-peak lane closures with narrow lanes: Splitter Islands



These dates are subject to change with an earlier completion date anticipated than currently planned.

Explore gardening topics with John Simmons

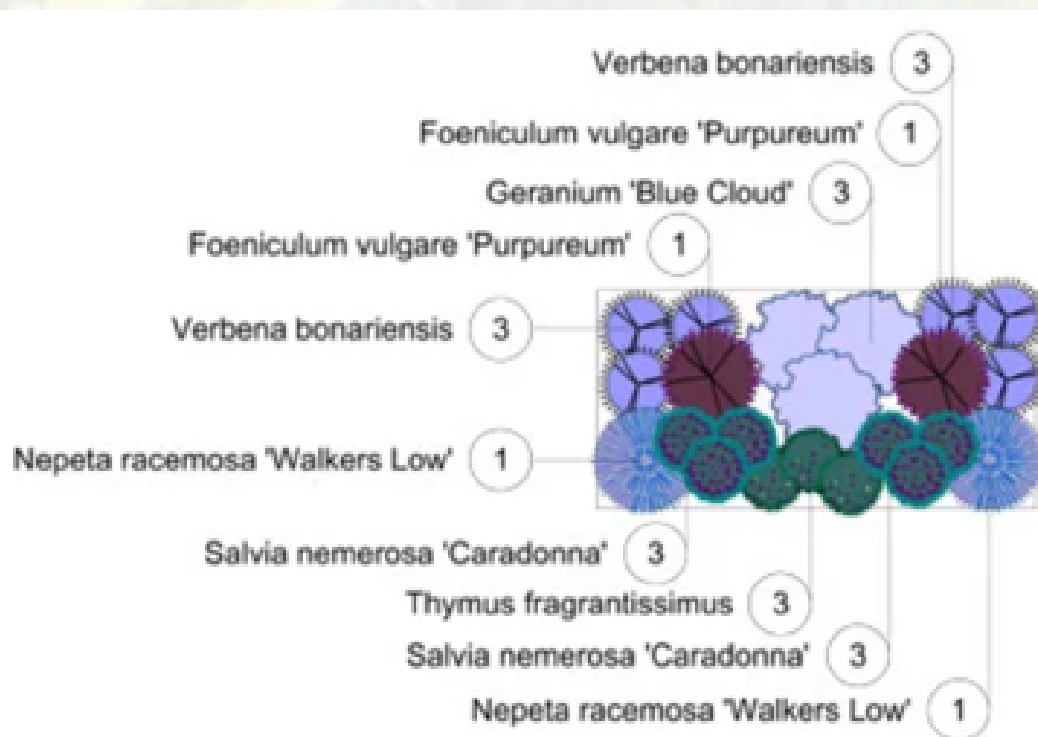
June is a big month for my us, as we are opening our garden as part of the National Open Garden Scheme, from 2-5pm on the 20th and 21st. I feel like I have been preparing for this since last autumn, as everything I have been doing in the garden has been done with the nagging thought as to how it will look in June. Hopefully good!

It has been an odd May as, after April's unseasonable warmth, May has been distinctly chilly, particularly overnight. I'm a member of numerous garden and plant related Facebook groups and there have been numerous comments from people who have lost tomatoes, chillies, annuals and the like because of frost. That is far from unheard of for May, but not that common either. Hopefully you've held back on putting anything too tender outside, but you should certainly be safe to do so now.

The cold of May has definitely held things back. Perennials such as Oriental poppies and lupins will normally have finished flowering, but you may find they are still going well into June. Once they finish cut them back hard. You'll get a fresh flush of foliage and, possibly, a second flowering. Stake the tall stuff, such as hollyhocks and delphiniums, and tie in the wispy stems of plants like clematis and climbing roses.

If you haven't done so already then plant up summer hanging baskets and containers asap. Remember to follow the Thriller-Filler-Spiller formula that I talked about in last month's column. Half-hardy annuals can go outside now. They'll be vulnerable to slugs and snails at first so you may need to deploy beer traps.

Why not have a go at creating a border to attract wildlife? Pollinating insects are strongly attracted to yellow, blue and purple flowers, and even a bed of just a couple of square metres can support a number of pollinator friendly plants, such as those in the planting scheme below.



Planting a new bed with perennials at this time of year means you'll have to water it through prolonged dry spells as the plants get their roots down.

Softwood cuttings can be taken from the young growth of deciduous shrubs such as fuchsias and hydrangeas. Choose a healthy non-flowering shoot and remove it using a sharp knife. Take several cuttings at the same time. Now, race back to base as the cuttings will now be losing moisture. Trim them cutting to just below a leaf joint so that they are 5-10cm long (depending on the material being used) and remove the lower leaves. Insert them at the edge of a pot filled with free-draining, but moist, compost; you should be able to fit several cuttings around the perimeter of the pot. Cover the pot with a clear polythene bag held in position with an elastic band. This will help prevent wilting. Place in a well-lit position out of direct sunlight.

In the vegetable garden you can plant out sweetcorn now. Plant them in blocks rather than rows, as this aids pollination. Mulch around thirsty crops such as beans and courgettes to hold in moisture around their roots. Similarly, water vegetables and fruit in containers regularly, especially during dry sunny weather. Feed tomatoes, courgettes, pumpkins and chillies once a week. Rejuvenate chives by cutting the clump down to the base, for a fresh crop of new leaves in just a few weeks

That's it for this month. Jill and I hope very much to see you all on the 20th or 21st of June. Tea and cake will be served!

The grounds are naturally divided into three key areas, with the fourth, a woodland walk, in development. A cottage garden with rose beds, wildflower area and a summerhouse. A small flower field is the main working area, with many different varieties of cut flowers grown in allocated perennial beds with an alternating array of annual species. The main family garden has rose arches, a long bed and ancient mulberry tree, and is the perfect place to admire the view.

Update from Tessa Munt, MP for Churchill and Langford

Hello everyone,

In April, I held my 200th surgery since July 2024. I'm always happy to listen to you, wherever you catch me! I look forward to the next 200!

Locally, I've met with residents and officials about informal 'festivals' on private land, Ofsted's South Western Regional Director to discuss education and care, an officer from the Woodland Trust, and the Rivers Trust about sewage spills and water quality in my 'patch'.

I've been working for some time with a constituent on persuading the Prime Minister to meet with the families of those who died in the 1994 Mull of Kintyre Chinook helicopter crash. The opportunity arose to press the PM on this during Prime Minister's Questions, and I'm pleased he gave his assurance he'd meet with the group. I continue to keep a close eye on this situation as 32 years later, it's as important as ever that the families know why their loved ones were put on

an aircraft deemed "*positively dangerous*", "*unairworthy*" and "*not to be relied on in any way whatsoever*" by military experts at the time, and that the lessons from this terrible accident will be learned by the services and agencies involved.

In Westminster, I met a Treasury Minister to discuss provision of Basic Financial Advice for consumers, Health officials about what's available for those with ME, attended an Inter-Governmental Round Table on Frozen Pensions, and accompanied constituents to a meeting with a Justice Minister to discuss victims' rights when prisoners are deported.

In Parliament, I led a short debate on regulating the sale of marmalade. Headlines about 'rebranding' marmalade post-Brexit have led to confusion about what is, and what is not, 'marmalade'. Bristol University analysed marmalade in the 1920s and traditionally, it comprises only citrus fruits. I'm pushing Government to recognise the importance of ingredients used and set standards for one of our most successful exports.

Many of you raised concerns about the Terminally Ill Adults (End of Life) Bill, which stalled on its passage through the House of Lords. A new Bill will have to be reintroduced to the House of Commons for this to progress further. If you'd like to be kept updated, please let me know.

I'm holding two events for constituents in June:

Monday, 22nd June from 19:00 to 20:00: I'll be joined by members of IPSEA (Independent Provider of Special Education Advice) for an online discussion about the future of SEND provision.

Monday 29th June – daytime: I'll be holding a 'Parliamentary Insight Day' in Westminster for young adults aged 18-23 who are interested in a career in Politics. You'll have a tour of Parliament, spend time with my team, watch proceedings in the Chamber and learn how Parliament works.
